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Trustees' report For the year ended 31 March 2019

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019. The Trustees confirm that the Annual Report and financial statements of the charity comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charities governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Since the charity qualifies as small under section 383, the strategic report required of medium and large companies under The Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Director's Report) Regulations 2013 is not required.

Public benefit

SNAAP's (Special Needs Advisory and Activities Project) charitable purposes are for public benefit and fall within the description 'the relief of those in need, by reason of youth, age, ill-health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage' in the Charities Act.

Objectives and Activities

In planning our activities, we keep in mind the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and ensure that, through regular consultation with our service users, we provide services that meet their needs.

Our focus remains on providing leisure and social activities for disabled children and young people and support and information to their parents and carers.

We seek feedback from our families continuously and this, along with monitoring and evaluating our activities, ensures that our work remains focused on our stated aims and objectives and also proves we are providing high quality services.

We also ensure that the whole family's needs are taken into consideration, including non-disabled siblings when organising events.

We ask families to pay a small fee for many of SNAAP's activities as a contribution towards costs but if a family is unable to pay, due to its financial circumstances, we make sure the service is still available to them.

SNAAP works with a wide range of members of the public such as professionals, supporters, funders, interested parties and volunteers and therefore, also benefits the general public.

Achievements and performance

During the financial year we have continued to develop the range of services offered to disabled children and young people and their parents and carers and have made progress towards delivering targets set out in our strategic plan, a copy of which is available on our website www.snaap.org.uk.

This included the consolidation of our expansion beyond the Canterbury district, with Kent County Council (KCC) funding for Saturday and Holiday clubs for disabled children who live in Canterbury, Swale and Shepway districts. The continuation of this programme allowed us to maintain a large team of sessional staff.

Achievements and performance (continued)

Being based at Windchimes, a dedicated disabled children's centre in Herne Bay, we are often called upon to help a parent or carer visiting the centre. The support and advice we are able to provide is now a core part of our service and is open to all families on our database.

We continued to provide customised support to families through our dedicated family support officer who provided information and one-to-one support to families, which was specifically targeted at those in crisis situations. We are pleased to be able to offer this valuable service which helps families deal with multiple problems they face from time-to-time.

Our programme of school holiday leisure activities ran throughout the year and these have included a wide range of family days, where disabled children and their families attend parties and trips to local attractions. Our biennial flagship event, Winter Wonderland, took place in December 2018.

We started a "Community Share" scheme which allows families to share unwanted items, such as clothes and toys, with other families. Such was its success that we have expanded this to include donations of food and other items from supermarkets which would otherwise be discarded. This fulfils a dual purpose in that families in need are supported by the "Community Share" and items which would originally be destined for the landfill are "recycled" in the community.

During school term we ran our regular sports club, our youth clubs and our after-school club. We run our extensive toy and resource library as part of our weekly Stay and Play sessions and the loan of resources has been very effective. Family Support advice is also available at the weekly Stay and Play sessions. A new baby and toddler group – SNAAP-EY's for children with additional needs began in autumn 2018 and runs weekly. It is proving popular with families and our Family Support Officer is on hand to provide support and advice to parents.

We continued to lease an accessible beach hut in Whitstable, which has proved to be a valuable and much appreciated facility for our families. We used it for a range of SNAAP activities throughout the year, and also offered it to families for a small hire fee which proved exceptionally popular during the summer holidays.

There has been a change to the Board during the year and the members of the Board are noted in the Reference and Administrative details of the charity on Page 1 of the report. We wish to extend our thanks to Mrs Tracey Becker for her committed support of the charity during her term of office. She stood down as a Board member in 2018.

We continue to improve and update our website, and make use of social media tools, such as Facebook, Instagram and Twitter, to publicise our services and connect with our service users. This multimedia approach enables us to communicate actively with our families and supporters.

We would like to thank all those who have provided funding, advice and undertaken many challenges to support our charity during the year. In particular, we would like to thank Global's Make Some Noise, who, in 2017-18 selected SNAAP as one of their chosen charities and awarded a total of £68,000 towards funding leisure activities over two years. Also, the activities of TEAM-SNAAP who have continued to raise money for the charity by running in various marathons, half marathons and other fund-raising events. Details of their successes can be found on their Facebook page. We are also grateful to the Lady Mayoress of Canterbury who selected SNAAP as one of her two beneficiary charities for her term of office which expires in May 2019. SNAAP's staff and Board members have been supporting her various fund-raising activities throughout the year.

Finally, we would like to thank all the staff and volunteers for their hard work and professionalism during the year, so that disabled children and their families living in East Kent can benefit from SNAAP's services.

Financial review

a. Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

b. Review of financial position

The total income for the year amounted to: £237,051 (£196,166 restricted and £40,885 unrestricted). The associated expenditure for the year was £225,055 (£194,507 restricted and £30,498 unrestricted). This gives a net surplus in funds for the year of £12,046 (restricted funds £3,340 surplus after transfers and unrestricted funds a £8,706 suplus after transfers). This balance of funding added to the brought forward balance of reserves from 2017/18 of £147,374 gives a total reserve carried forward to 2019/20 of £159,420 (£24,994 restricted and £134,426 unrestricted).

We continue to ensure that funds donated for restricted purposes are properly recorded and accounted for.

The principal sources of funds in 2018-19 were:

This year, 91% (£203,696) of the expenditure can be attributed directly to SNAAP's core activities, with £1,110 to fundraising and £20,199 related to support and governance costs for the charity.

Structure, governance and management

a. Constitution

The charity is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee, with company number 06800689 and was set up by a Trust Deed on 14 December 2004. The charity is governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association adopted on 22 June 2011.

The charity's objects are principally for the relief of children and young persons with disabilities or special needs, living in the East Kent area, by the provision of information, advice and support to their parents, leisure activities for the children and young people and such other charitable activities as the Trustees in their absolute discretion shall decide.

b. Method of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association.

c. Organisational structure and decision making

The charity is controlled by the Trustees, who delegate the day-to-day running of the charity to the Manager.

Plans for future periods

The Trustees will continue to support the objectives of the Charity for the foreseeable future.

In assessing our commitments for 2019/20 we anticipate that there may be a shortfall in income to meet certain activities. The Trustees are of the opinion that the shortfall arising on specific activities will be met from General (Unrestricted) Reserves. The value of future commitments is estimated at £52,569 in the coming year. The effect on Reserves is as follows:-

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

SNAAP meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

1.2 Company status

The company is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the company.

1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Income

All income is recognised once the company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity.

Charitable activities are costs incurred on the charity's operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the company.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Accounting policies (continued)

1.6 Going concern

After reviewing the charity's forecasts and projections, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The charity therefore continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing its consolidated financial statements.

1.7 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the company; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

1.8 Operating leases

Rentals under operating leases are charged to the Statement of financial activities incorporating income and expenditure account on a straight line basis over the lease term.

1.9 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

1.10 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.11 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the company anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

1.12 Financial instruments

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1.13 Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund in respect of the year.

Purposes of restricted funds

CCC - The Strategic Grant Fund (formerly CCC - Single Gateway)

The purpose of this grant is a contribution towards the core costs of the charity.

CCC - Film Club

This provides a relaxed monthly film club at Windchimes and funding pays for the film license and staffing.

KCC - Festability

Festability. Providing SNAAP staff to this inclusive music festival enabling our families to attend. Staff provide support to our families including helping to manage behaviour, personal care and feeding.

KCC - Disabled Children's Service's Term Time Activities (formerly Saturday Club)

This funding paid for a regular specialist weekend club for disabled children and young people aged 8-17 living in the Canterbury, Swale and Shepway areas of Kent providing parents and carers with a short break while their children have fun.

KCC - Disabled Children's Service's Holiday Activities (formerly Summer Play Scheme)

This funding paid for a specialist play scheme for disabled children aged 8-17, in the Canterbury, Swale and Shepway districts run throughout the summer school holiday, providing parents and carers with a short break while their children have fun.

KCC - Buzz Canterbury (formerly KCC Disabled Children's Services Buzz (Canterbury))

This scheme provides children, with less complex needs, a holiday playscheme. The children are aged 8-15.

St Nicholas School

To provide activities and support to pupils of the school in agreement with the school.

Global's Make Some Noise - Family Activity Programme

This funding provides Play Staff, a Cook and Family Support Worker at our Stay & Play club, as well as providing staff for family days out throughout school holidays.

The Henry Smith Charity - Family Support Service

This funding provides a Family Support Worker for 10 hours a week.

SNAAP - EY's

A weekly drop in support group for parents and carers of babies and toddlers with additional needs.

Mary Sheridan Charity - Community Share

Ensuring families who are struggling to make ends meet have access to free food/toiletries and other essentials, including second hand children's clothes and shoes. Some of these items are donated by local supermarkets.

Minibus Short Breaks

Donation received towards the continuation of the mini-bus days out for disabled children aged 8-17 years living in the Canterbury district.

Beach Hut

Monies raised to gain access to a beach hut in Whitstable for use by SNAAP families.

Winter Wonderland

This funding helps us to provide this biennial event at Christmas which is held at Windchimes.
